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About the Instructor

Donald McNeeley (DBS, Triune Biblical University) comes to Tidewater Bible College with over 27 years in biblical archaeology, education, spiritual formation, business management, and project management experiences. In September 2004, he began the Church and Biblical Research Group with an emphasis on reaching, keeping, and teaching men and women for Christ through studies in biblical archaeology, spiritual formation, and worship. Dr. McNeeley has used his understandings from these three areas to create innovative retreats for the church and other presentations. He has authored a Bible Handbook, a multitude of articles and presentations on the integration of scripture with archaeological remains, and several book reviews, in addition to a periodic biblical archaeology conference entitled *Faith and Archaeology*. A recent presentation was *Essene Ethics Revealed at Qumran* which analyzed the ethics revealed in their *Rule of the Community*. His current research interests are with the development of concepts that integrate spiritual formation into a holistic worship environment and the biblical understanding we can obtain from study of biblical archaeology.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course assists in preparing you to use Biblical Hebrew in your Bible study and sermon preparation. This is accomplished by leading the student though a thorough introduction to tapping into Hebrew word meanings and grammatical analysis using English-based tools. The course focuses on strategies and techniques that are straightforward and easy to follow and will demonstrate that the interpretive payoff that comes with knowing Hebrew is well within your grasp.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, participants will:

- 1. Possess the capability to produce sound Hebrew word studies.
- 2. Be able to recognize fallacies that are to be avoided when doing Hebrew Word studies.
- 3. Will have an understanding of the various grammatical Hebrew terminologies.
- 4. Obtain a tool box of techniques that allow finding specific Hebrew grammatical features.
- 5. Learn how to use the results of your Hebrew grammatical studies in sermons and academic work.

A minimum of seven citations from references, excluding Bible references are required. You must use the Turabian citation method in this paper.

- d) Present highlights from your paper in class (five minutes maximum). Do not read the paper.
- e) An outline is provided at end of syllabus.

4. 30% - In Class Project

- a) Due Class Ten 11 November 2010
 - i. Using the concepts learned in class perform various functions and tasks associated with understanding the Biblical text.
- b) Approx. Time = 3 Hours

Note: All work is expected to be presented with proper grammar, sentence structure, spelling, and punctuation (Turabian). Occasional mistakes will be overlooked, but CARELESSNESS will definitely affect the grade (but not more than one grade level.) All assignments are to be completed and submitted on or before the assigned time. If late, the grade received for them will be no higher than a "B" in accordance with the school catalog.
