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About the Instructor

Donald McNeeley (DBS, Triune Biblical University) comes to Tidewater Bible College with over 26 years in biblical archaeology, education, spiritual formation, business management, and project management experiences. In September 2004, he began the Church and Biblical Research Group with an emphasis on reaching, keeping, and teaching men and women for Christ through studies in biblical archaeology, spiritual formation, and worship. Dr. McNeeley has used his understandings from these three areas to create innovative retreats for the church and other presentations. He has authored a Bible Handbook, a multitude of articles and presentations on the integration of scripture with archaeological remains, and several book reviews, in addition to a periodic biblical archaeology conference entitled *Faith and Archaeology*. A recent presentation was *Essene Ethics Revealed at Qumran* which analyzed the ethics revealed in their *Rule of the Community*. His current research interests are with the development of concepts that integrate spiritual formation into a holistic worship environment and the biblical understanding we can obtain from study of biblical archaeology.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an overview of cultural anthropology and how our understanding of scripture and missionary activities can be enhanced by that understanding.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, participants will:

1. Possess a broad understanding of cultural anthropology from a Christian perspective.

- 2. Be able to apply cultural anthropological concepts to appropriate scripture obtaining a better and more complete understanding of the meaning for that scripture.
- 3. Be able to apply cultural anthropological concepts to a culture obtaining a better and more complete understanding of the culture that missionaries will encounter.
- 4. Be able to discus anthropology concepts from a theological basis.

- b) Approx. Time = 5 Hours
- c) The paper should be between 800 to 1,000 words, approximately 4-5 pages of content plus Cover Sheet, Bibliography, and Foot Notes. Double Spaced, 1" margins, 12 pix. Font. A minimum of three references from references and the Bible are required. You must use the Turabian citation method in this paper.
- d) Present highlights from your paper in class (three minutes maximum). Do not read the paper.

4. 30% - Applying Cultural Anthropology Concepts to Scripture Paper

- a) Due Class Ten 9 November 2010
 - i. Using the concepts learned in class and additional research, select a portion of scripture and analyze it using the concepts learned in class.
 - ii. Demonstrate how your understanding of cultural anthropology assisted in understanding the scripture.
- b) Approx. Time = 5 Hours
- c) The paper should be between 800 to 1,000 words, approximately 4-5 pages of content plus Cover Sheet, Bibliography, and Foot Notes. Double Spaced, 1" margins, 12 pix. Font. A minimum of three references from references and the Bible are required. You must use the Turabian citation method in this paper.
- d) Present highlights from your paper in class (three minutes maximum). Do not read the paper.

Note: All work is expected to be presented with proper grammar, sentence structure, spelling, and punctuation (Turabian). Occasional mistakes will be overlooked, but CARELESSNESS will definitely affect the grade (but not more than one grade level.) All assignments are to be completed and submitted on or before the assigned time. If late, the grade received for them will be no higher than a "B" in accordance with the school catalog.
